WPLN Newsroom

The Country in Our Hearts

Led by Reporter Rose Gilbert, WPLN completed its first ever global reporting project: a multimedia exploration of the ties between Nashville's Kurdish community and our sister city of Erbil, Kurdistan. The culminating podcast, The Country in Our Hearts, was featured via NPR One and The World by PRX, reaching a global audience. The work included extended sections of untranslated Kurdish highlighting the cultural weight of a language that has, at times, been stigmatized, banned or even criminalized. Supported by oral histories, original Kurdish artwork and community scholars, the project helped preserve cultural memories and deepen civic understanding of one of Nashville's most significant immigrant communities.

Launch of Appalachia + Mid-South Newsroom

In Fall 2024, Nashville Public Radio became a lead station in NPR's Appalachia + Mid-South Newsroom, a collaboration of public media stations in Kentucky, West Virginia and Tennessee that strengthens our reporting and extends our reach. The network helps us track regional patterns and bring that context to local stories, surfacing overlooked narratives across rural and urban communities in the southeast.

WPLN's investigative journalism continues to earn national recognition for its depth and originality. Work by Criminal Justice Reporter Paige Pfleger and Senior Reporter/Producer of Special Projects Meribah Knight was featured on HBO's *Last Week Tonight with John Oliver*. The show highlighted investigations into Knoxville's Richard L. Bean Center and the illegal jailing of youth chronicled in *The Kids of Rutherford County* podcast. This feature underscores how local reporting can surface systemic issues that shape national discourse.

Paige Pfleger attended a **live reading and audience discussion of her story** "In Rural Tennessee, Domestic Violence Victims Face Barriers to Getting Justice. One County Has Transformed Its Approach." The evening was produced in partnership with WNYC and Theater of War.

Nashville Public Radio's Music Citizens podcast spotlights behind-the-scenes heroes of Nashville's music industry. Two new episodes launched this year: "The Operator" explored the local and international vinyl industry through Piper Payne, founder of Physical Music Products, whose small-batch manufacturing contrasts with the global vinyl boom; and "The Tuner" profiled master piano tuner Brent Arledge, whose precise work shapes the sound of Nashville's most iconic venues and GRAMMY Award-winning studio recordings. We celebrated both episodes with a listening event at Vinyl Tap where guests received a special-edition pressing of the podcast on vinyl.
